Shared worship with First United Presbyterian Church that was initiated at the outset of the pandemic continued. While Wood Fellowship Hall served as beautiful worship space, the return to the sanctuary in October was joy-filled and aweinspiring. Strategic Objective: Worship

One of our 2022 Strategic Objectives was to create a Sunday experience of worship, learning, and fellowship. A goal of our success in that regard was to have a weekly average of 275 people in person for worship (from September 1 to December 31). We are pleased to say that during that period, our weekly average attendance was 363 in-person worshippers.

GOALS FOR 2023

With rhythms and patterns of participation resumed, Adult Formation will expand Sunday offerings during Lent and will continue to offer classes and small groups in a hybrid format. Bible studies and fellowship groups will remain vital for connecting on a deeper level. The Pathways to Discipleship website remains as a place to access past classes and explore extra resources. Rev. Dr. Serene Jones, the 2023 Willard speaker, and other programming will acknowledge the need to attend to our mental health and the call to treat one another with

dignity. New fellowship groups and opportunities will be offered in late winter and spring. Many of these will be focused on shared interests and fun activities. Special focus will be given to the continued growth in engagement of people in their early to mid-twenties.

Adult Formation was pleased to host many events that reconnected our congregation with one another and with our church facility, including a September scavenger hunt that reacquainted all ages with our beloved building. This resurgence contributed to our ministry exceeding its programmatic growth goals.

Thematically, classes and other programming emphasized how we are called to show God's love to others and to ourselves. A Sunday series led by Sun Counseling and Wellness featured ways we can flourish as God desires for us. Child Development Center


The Child Development Center is a thriving, caring community fully engaged in demonstrating the teachings of Jesus Christ each day. Our Nurture Covenant remains our touchstone and guide for this important work. The staff and families are committed to creating an environment that promotes and celebrates each child's individuality and recognizes their importance in our future.

We are continuing the work of fulfilling the charge given by the Session to increase diversity within the CDC enrollment. It remains our goal to have our community reflect a variety of cultures. With the full support of the FPC Schools' Board, diversity criteria was added to our priority waiting list. Local Outreach

The Local Outreach Committee has been hard at work continuing to implement the strategic plan developed in 2020 with the help of C.A. Friend Consulting. Our goal of deepening community impact required the difficult task of reducing our number of community partners. In 2021, we awarded grants to 30 partners; in 2022, we reduced that number to 17. In alignment with our strategic plan goals, we focused our efforts on organizations that are addressing the needs of our neighbors in the 28208 zip code, where we already have a presence from our longstanding partnership with Westerly Hills Academy. Members of the Local Outreach committee met with our partners twice in 2022 to build relationships, discuss challenges and priorities, and learn how First Presbyterian Church and its members can best support their work in our community.



Global Outreach

Global Missions continues to support our mission partners despite obstacles presented by COVID, political unrest, and war. A small but mighty group from FPC traveled to Cuba to visit our partners at Matanzas Evangelical Theological Seminary. FPC is helping to support the Seminary's addition of a second campus in Havana. The goal is to train more pastors to bring the gospel of Jesus Christ to more Cubans.

An outbreak of COVID cases forced the cancellation of our mission trip to Mexico. Still, we continue to support our partner Accion Ministries in housing students from surrounding villages so they may attend middle and high school. A residential facility has also been built to house girls wishing to attend university, a first for the community.



Advocacy

This year the Advocacy Committee offered the congregation opportunities to learn and think about how we are Christians in our city. Through our five subcommittees, Anti-racism, Climate Change, Education, Housing and Homelessness, and the Plowshares book club, events offered throughout the year engaged more than 300 participants. Plowshares joined together to discuss four books ("How the Word is Passed," "Tomorrow's Bread," "The Book of Joy" and "Saving Us") as well as three congregational education events (Brooklyn Neighborhood Discussion, Climate Change Panel, and Wealth Gap Simulation). The history hallway and the Repentance and Reconciliation triptych were accomplished by the work and support of the Anti-racism subcommittee. In 2023, we will continue the work of congregational education and advocacy by offering events in each subcommittee area.







Care


This year, First Presbyterian members and staff have risen to the occasion of providing ongoing support and care to one another as we entered into the endemic phase of COVID-19. The Counseling Center opened in the Fresco Lobby space in late September. Two counselors from Sun Counseling and Wellness began seeing patients full-time, 60 percent of whom are receiving some level of support from our scholarship fund. The counselors also provide 12 hours of mental health education annually to FPC and the wider community. Our 20 Stephen Ministers attended three hours per month of supervision groups and continuing education and provided regular one-on-one care to 15 individuals. FPC pastors presided over 20 funerals, 37 baptisms, and six weddings.

Fifteen Presbyterian Women circles met monthly, 55 women attended the spring retreat at Camp Kanuga, and over 150 people attended the Advent Communion service and luncheon.

over 90 children and adults. She also joins the pastoral

Our staff managed our operating expenses to a level that allowed us to end the year's expenses under budget by close to \$100,000.
